An Overview of New Legislation and Program Plans Aiming to Improve Quality of and Access to Mental Health Services.

NEWLY UPDATED FOR 2020



In 2014, the Protecting Access to Medicare Act (H.R. 4302) passed in Congress. Section 223 of this legislation establishes a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC) program to improve mental health services in select states. It establishes clear definitions and service guidelines for CCBHCs, creating a common definition for high quality, accessible, and comprehensive care. It also outlines two new payment models to improve reimbursements by using costs of services provided rather than fee schedules. The original legislation earmarked \$1.1 billion for the community behavioral health care system. The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act included provisions to expand the demonstration program through November 30th, 2020 It also added two additional states (Kentucky and Michigan) to the demonstration program.

Program Requirements

Staffing

Staff must have diverse disciplinary backgrounds with required licenses. Staff must be culturally and linguistically trained to serve the needs of the patient population.

Care Coordination

Coordination across settings and providers to ensure seamless care transitions across the full spectrum of health services, including acute, chronic, and behavioral health.

Quality


Accessibility

Availability and accessibility of services, including 24-hour crisis services, sliding scale fees, and no rejection for services based on a patient's ability to pay or place of residence.

Service Scope

Provision of 9 specific services reflecting personcentered care practices. Services must be provided through the CCBHC or through a partnership with another provider.

Organizational Authority



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
